All students registered in one of the Peace Science Courses are required to submit a report entitled "My Approach to Peace" as a common course assignment. No credits will be awarded if you fail to submit this. For further information about grading, please consult the syllabus.

AY2025 [Common assignment for Peace Science Courses] A Report entitled: "My Approach to Peace"

1. Introduction

Professor Tatsuo Morito, the first president of Hiroshima University, had the vision to make the university a cultural and spiritual center of Peace City Hiroshima that had arisen after the atomic bombing of 1945, and he described the institution as "a single unified university, free and pursuing peace." Thus, "the spirit of pursuing peace" became the university's primary principle.

In addition, five peace principles guide the members of Hiroshima University to remember the tragedy of war and nurture aspirations for disarmament and the abolition of nuclear weapons while cultivating personal virtue. With that aim, all students are to take one of the mandatory peace science courses in which they explore the concept of peace through various filters, including poverty, hunger, population growth, environment, education, and culture. The students also examine the meaning of peace in light of their life experiences. The peace science courses offer new students ample opportunity to reflect deeply on what peace is.

Your report, "My Approach to Peace," should address the pre-assigned tasks, such as peace-themed monument visits or video viewing.

2. Creation and submitting your report

2-1. Creation of report

After completing the pre-assignments, please write a report of approximately 1200 words in Japanese (or 500 words in English) on "What peace means to me and how I propose to contribute to creating peace in a given circumstance" following the instructions (theme, keywords, etc.) provided by your class instructor.

(i) Pre-assignments (primary tasks)

Before writing your report, you must complete the following pre-assignments.

[All Requried]

Visiting peace-related monuments or facilities (at least one).

- · Choose one or more monuments or facilities to visit.
 - * Your chosen monuments do not have to include public and commercial facilities such as the Peace Memorial Museum (Hiroshima City) and the Yamato Museum (Kure City). You can also select some remnants of war and ruins in your area.

• <u>Advance reservations are recommended</u> when visiting facilities that are expected to be crowded, such as Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum.

[One or more from A or B (both may be selected)]

Task A. Watch peace-related movies (more than 30 minutes long).

- Select from "List of Videos" in Appendix 2, "List of Videos and Testimonies relating to peace"
- The videos should be at least 30 minutes long. You can also watch a combination of shorter videos that amount to more than 30 minutes of viewing (e.g., three 10-minute videos).
- Watching multiple videos on a single website is also permitted.
- If a student attends "Ms. Keiko Ogura's A-Bomb Experience" Special Lecture, it will be credited as Task A. (added on June 2, 2025).

Task B. Read peace-related stories (more than three).

- Read at least three stories, such as A-bomb survivor's testimonies, from the "List of Testimonies" in Appendix 2, "List of Videos and Testimonies relating to peace"
- You are permitted to choose three or more stories from a single website.

(ii) Report format

- Use PC to write your report, and you must use the designated template in a word format (i.e. handwritten reports will NOT be accepted).
- The template is downloadable from the "Momiji" website (URL below). Go to: Momiji TOP→learning support →liberal arts education →information on subjects →Peace Science Courses. Word count should be approximately 500 words.
- Do not change the page settings (Line spacing, margins, etc.), font(Yu Mincho (游明朝)) and the template's font size (10.5 points).
- Indicate at the top of your report the title and the name of the speaker of the videos or written testimonies you consulted (see the report format). If a student attends "Ms. Keiko Ogura's A-Bomb Experience" for Task A, please write "Ms. Keiko Ogura's A-bomb Experience" in the Video ID number space (added on June 2, 2025). Your instructor will use these pieces of information to evaluate your primary tasks, so please do not forget to provide the required information in the designated form. If incomplete, points will be deducted from your score. You may submit only one PDF file for this assignment. Any images should be pasted inside your report.

- Read the "Guidelines for Report Writing" on the "Momiji TOP (Peace Science Courses Page)" carefully and take great care not to produce a dishonest report. Actions leading to plagiarism, fabrication, copyright infringement, etc., are prohibited in writing academic reports and papers, and must be strictly avoided.
- According to the "Policy on Generative AI (including ChatGPT) in Education at Hiroshima University", use of generative AI is not prohibited for the report, "My Approach to Peace", in Peace Science Courses. However, uncritical use of Generative AI outputs by simply copying and pasting them or in a similar fashion is not permitted. If students include generative AI outputs in their report, they must fill in "The purpose of using generative AI" and "Prompts that generated outputs" in the questionnaire on the report form. Although use of Generative AI does not affect the evaluation of the report, please follow the "General Guideline" prescribed in the Policy and instructions from teachers in each class when preparing your report.
